At the peak of construction at our Kilgallioch Windfarm, which straddles the Dumfries & Galloway and South Ayrshire border, there were more than 300 people working on site. When operational later this year, there will be 13 full-time posts created at the windfarm.

ScottishPower Renewables strives to ensure that local contractors benefit from the work available during the construction and operation of our windfarms. In Dumfries and Galloway we have worked with several local companies that recognise the value of the renewables industry.

Annandale and Nithsdale Community Benefit Company makes funds available to 42 community councils across Dumfriesshire and, to date, has awarded more than £560,000 to a variety of local community initiatives. The Ewe Hill community benefit fund will be managed by Dumfriesshire East Community Benefit Company for the benefit of



These communities are currently setting up their new companies before funds become available later this year.
